GUIDANCE, CAREERS & CO-OP





*Grade 11 students took part in the College Degree Panel highlighting degree programs at colleges.

*Careers classes visited Seneca College to learn more about college programs with emphasis on the business diploma and degree programs.

*The Canadian Armed Forces Royal Regiment of Canada visited WHCI and presented to Careers classes sharing information about the various career options in the military in the regular and reserve forces. Best of all are the subsidized college and university education programs.

*Coop students demonstrated their knowledge gained through their work experience at the Co-op Fair. They had placements at construction sites, schools, autobody shops, retail locations and Army Reserves.

*Many of the co-op students also took part in the dual credit program which is a great opportunity for high school students to attend college courses. *Guidance and the Health and Wellness students collaborated with our community partners (Elmbank Community Centre and Steeles L'Amoreaux Youth Empowerment) to put on the Community Fair with more than twenty agencies. Students took part in trivia contests and learned about career options and volunteer opportunities. Health and Wellness students earned their leadership certificates.

Starting with the school leadership conference at Humber College, our Eco-Club led several initiatives including the school wide cleanup where Eco-Club members along with the several students and teachers teamed up to collect litter and clean different areas of the school grounds.

Some other activities and events conducted by the Eco-Club this year include the milk bags for mattresses initiative where we recycled the outer printed milk bags, which are UV resistant and bug resistant, and used them to make mattresses for those in need. RELAY FOR LIFE

West Humber Collegiate Institute (WHCI) hosted their first Relay for Life event on Wednesday, Oct. 25, 2017. Relay for Life is a fundraiser for cancer research that high schools run in association with the Canadian Cancer Society.

Vidita Singh, a WHCI alumni student who has helped plan this event since she was in grade 12 last year, said that the Relay committee faced a few obstacles when planning their event, but overall it was a success. "This event impacted students in a positive way because they saw that there's always a light at the end of every tunnel, that all lives lost were not in vain and although cancer is a horrible disease, it is something that has brought us all together," Singh said. The event started at 11:30 a.m. until 6 p.m. on the field outside of the school.

During Relay, participants are expected to have at least one of their team members walking around the track, carrying the baton provided by the Cancer Society. In the middle of the field, various activities take place to engage the participants and celebrate life. The most anticipated event of West Humber's Relay day was the hair-cutting when three



Relay committee members volunteered to donate 12 inches of their hair in front of the whole crowd.

Jasmine Kaur Singh, a participant in grade nine, found Relay for Life to be a great way to start off her first year in high school. "Relay opened my eyes to the realities of cancer and it was amazing to see many students come together and support such a great cause, I can't wait for next year's event," she said. According to the Canadian Cancer Society, one in two Canadians will be diagnosed with cancer this year alone while one in four will die from it. In 2016, participants from 482 Relay events across Canada raised more than \$28-million towards cancer research.

West Humber's Relay committee worked with Courtney Rattan, a Relay for Life youth coordinator at the Canadian Cancer Society, who said that the money raised went towards funding support programs and services for people who are affected by cancer. "The Canadian Cancer Society has a program that drives cancer patients to and from their cancer-related appointments that would not be possible without our Relay event and we are also funding the best cancer research in Canada that is helping to find better treatments, prevent cancer and save lives," Rattan said.



Anupreet Singh, a WHCI alumni student who brought the idea of bringing Relay to the school in the first place, said she knew the event would have an impact on the students since their Relay rally in September. "Many students were seriously affected by the cancer statistics we told them about which opened their eyes to the point that they got emotional and some students had to leave. Just from that, we knew the event would definitely have a lasting impression on everyone and encourage people to donate," she said. By the day of their event, WHCI had the support of 95 participants who managed to raise 84 per cent of their goal, raising over \$8000.

The school has been determined to reach their goal by allocating funds from their school spirit week events towards the fundraising goal. West Humber's Relay committee have been planning this event since January 2017. Some of their members had the opportunity to go to Hamilton on

May 12 for the Relay university workshop where committees from various schools in the Greater Toronto Area shared tips and tricks on how to make their events a success. They shared ideas with one another and provided methods on how to fundraise money and get other students involved.

With this start-up, the committee routinely met in their lead staff advisor's, Mahfuza Rahman, room on Wednesdays at lunch and continued to meet throughout the summer once the school year was over. Over the summer, they reached out to many companies who sponsored and donated to their event such as Boston Pizza, Food Basics, Drupati's, Fortinos, Grace's Patty World, Pizza Pizza, Tim Hortons, Panago Pizza, Dollarama and Winners.

Mahfuza Rahman, the lead staff advisor of this initiative, said "So many of our school community has been affected by cancer: students, teachers, etc. Organizing this event allowed the students and school community to help fight against cancer in whatever way that they could!" News from the Social Justice Club

This year the Social Justice Club has focused once again on taking action on both local and international Social Justice issues. In the fall, we raised \$250 for Global Medic, an organization that sends first responders into disaster situations. In October, we sponsored a visit from author and Professor of Journalism at Ryerson University, Kamal al-Solaylee; he presented a summary of his book Brown to a group of senior students in the auditorium. A donation to Action Against Hunger was made on his behalf in thanks for this presentation. In December, we sponsored a school-wide letter-writing campaign Write for Rights where over 175 letters were sent to politicians around the world, writing on behalf of fourteen individuals who are unjustly imprisoned.

In February, a group of students spent a day at the Daily Bread Food Bank, helping to sort food donations, and their help was greatly appreciated. We also continued our relationship with a local youth shelter, Youth Without Shelter, with a guest speaker who discussed reasons for youth homelessness and all of the supports this organization provides to youth in our community. We then made a pasta and salad meal for 75 residents that was delivered to the shelter. We also held a bake sale to raise support for the first Etobicoke WALK for ALS that was organized by one of our students, Mahek Kaur.

Throughout the year, we have been looking at many non-governmental agencies through an organization called Kutoa. Each month, we look at three different projects sponsored by a particular agency, discuss each of their merits, and vote on where the online donations for that month should be directed. We also learned about KIVA, an online micro-finance agency.

In May, many of our students had the opportunity to partner with "Me to We" facilitators to discover their leadership styles, assets and passions. We look forward to the outcome of these workshops as the students begin a new initiative within our school community in the Fall...stay tuned! Thank you especially to all of our senior students who are moving on to new ventures next year. We hope you continue to be active and engaged in Social Justice issues in your post-Secondary years and beyond. All the best!





Etobicoke's First Annual ALS Walk held at WHCI

My mom Amrit was diagnosed with ALS five years ago and passed away from the disease in April 2017. A year later, when beginning Grade 9 at WHCI, I decided to organize this 3km walk, in her memory to raise \$10,000 for other ALS families. The walk was held on Saturday April 21st, and was attended by many student volunteers, as well as numerous teachers, our principal Mr. Alvi, ALS Canada representatives, vid-

eo journalist Mark Holmes, Councillor Vincent Crisanti, and many members of the public. To date, our team has raised \$31,200 to go towards helping ALS patients and their families through ALS Canada. I wanted to thank all of the WHCI families and staff members who contributed financially in supporting this cause.

As I often say, my mother was a people person, and an inspiration that gave me the courage to take on this goal and to accomplish it. That being said, our West Humber team plans to run this event annually. We have set the date for next year's ALS Walk for Saturday April 27, 2019 here at WHCI. We hope that our school community will be dedicated to helping change the course of this illness and we hope to see everyone at the Walk next year. 
