Head Concussions

Whitney has a great safety record but

accidents can happen. Kids are kids, always on the move, active, occasionally uncoordinated, and injuries such as concussions occur in school, albeit very rarely. We do recognize that we have a very active school population that takes advantage of many afterschool and weekend sports. It is required that if your child suffers a concussion outside of school that you inform us immediately. We will send you the mandatory TDSB forms that need to be filled out by your doctor. The administration and teachers MUST be made aware of any injuries suffered by a student so that we can be vigilant.



On Tuesday November 15th, 2016, students in grades 1 to 6 will be receiving Ontario's Fall Progress Report Card. At the TDSB, we respect the professionalism of our teachers and believe they understand the value and importance of reporting to parents on their child's progress.

progress report card (grades 1-6)

On Tuesday November 15th, your child will receive his/her Elementary Progress Report Card. The purpose of a progress report is to encourage early and ongoing communication between you and your child's

teacher. As you may be aware, a large focus on all report cards is on the learning skills and work habits. At Whitney, we feel that the development of these learning skills is an integral part of a student's learning. We feel it is important that all children clearly understand teacher expectations with regards to their learning and work habits on a day to day basis in all subject areas for self-improvement.

In an effort to support students learning in advance of the reporting period, the teachers at Whitney have created the attached charts (primary- grades 1-3) and junior (grades 4-6) into child friendly language. Teachers will go over these terms with the students in class and we also ask that you take a moment to review them with your child, using the chart(s) below to help guide you.

K-8 Update

On November 1st, the PART committee held its fourth and final meeting. Parent representation from Deer Park, Whitney and Rosedale PS were present, along with principals, Superintendents, trustees and members of the TDSB planning department. After some discussion and review of the TDSB survey results, the group came to a consensus and recommended that Whitney P.S. remain a K-6 school at this time.

However, the TDSB planning department will continue to explore alternative solutions to address the accommodation pressure on Deer Park. In the spring of 2017, the TDSB will schedule PART meetings with other neighboring schools that currently feed into Deer Park. The results of those meetings may impact Whitney, which may likely require our PART committee to revisit the issue and possibly re-consider Whitney becoming a K-8 school.






For the past 19 years, People for Education has been the voice for public education in Ontario. As an independent charitable organization, we work to ensure that public education realizes its promise. We
