The belief is that if kids are active in play, they are less likely to be involved in inappropriate behaviour and poor decision making. The stats are in and as a result of the program. we notice a marked decline in the number of issues brought to teachers last year. The program also provides a positive play opportunity for students who often have a hard time finding someone else to play with at recess. Now they have a whole group of kids! We're very proud of our Junior students for taking on such amazing leadership roles in the school, and we're sure they'll have an outstanding year!

Thank you Oxfam Canada for all of your work helping victims of natural disasters.




Our Remembrance Assembly will be on Friday November 10 at 10:40 a.m. in the gym. Parents are welcome to join us.

Interested grade six students applied for one of ten volunteer spots. Many fantastic applications were prepared. As a group, the ten chosen students will visit Beverley school once a month to help out in five separate elementary classrooms. This program has proven to be a fantastic way to help our student develop understanding for those who have different abilities, to help them appreciate the challenges that some children face on a daily basis, to provide opportunities for them to act as role models and mentors to the

children at Beverley school and for them to experience the impact of helping others. Our first visit to Beverly School was on Oct. 27. We had a great morning participating in daily life at Beverley School.

We know that the coyote was received at The Toronto Wildlife Centre and is doing just fine. It is receiving nourishment and being treated for some mange. So this adventure turned out to be a good thing for both the coyote and for students.
