

Reminders:

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Thank you for working together with the Yorkview Staff to help keep your children safe. Please take a moment to review the following points as we are still experiencing issues with:

- Parking in the School Parking Lot: Parking on the property is for Yorkview Staff only; do not park/drop off students there in the morning as it causes our staff to be delayed in entering the school when they have to wait for parking. Ms Manoukas is out most days to help remind everyone. Yorkview Kids Care families are also reminded that they should not enter the parking lot after 8:30 am. Thank you
- Early Pick Up: If you have to pick up your child before the end of the school day, we ask that you contact your child's teacher beforehand. Signing out after 3.10 pm is very disruptive to the classes as they are preparing to end the day.
- Respectful Behaviour: is expected by everyone on TDSB Property at all times, this includes Students, Staff and Visitors as per TDSB Code of Conduct. If you need to discuss an issue, please contact your child's teacher via phone call/email.



Our Bus Loop: is open for drop off BEFORE 9am, or once the buses start arriving. We ask you to be respectful when interacting with the staff when asked to move, or are directed elsewhere. Additionally, do not park or leave your car in the bus loop at any time as it causes problems to our buses when they try to enter the loop.

As students prepare for this day, there are often questions and concerns about Halloween costumes. To support safe, welcoming and dynamic learning spaces, we would like to remind students and families that certain costumes are viewed as offensive, inappropriate and/or discriminatory to many different cultures/ peoples, and as a result can cause harm to members of that community and the TDSB community.

Additionally, school communities are reminded that it is important to be aware of the potential negative and triggering impact violent images and/or scenarios can have on students and families with varying lived experiences and backgrounds.

Accessible Trick or Treating

Over 400,000 children in Canada and 4 million children in the United States identify as having one or more disabilities. Disabilities that may prevent them from enjoying trick-or-treating with their siblings and other kids. 


