RETURNING TO SCHOOL A GUIDE TO THE SAFE REOPENING OF THE TDSB

Introduction

The health and safety of our students and staff is a top priority as we reopen schools and administrative buildings. As we continue efforts to slow the spread of COVID-19, returning to school and work will look different, but every effort is being made to support students and staff in this transition.

As school starts in the fall, it is critical that we do everything possible to ensure the health and safety of all school community members, while also providing the best academic experience possible for students, supporting mental health and well-being and considering the needs of families and staff.

TDSB Parent Concern Protocol - 2020-2021

When reaching out to your School, Principal and Superintendent this is the process we follow

Step One - Classroom Teacher

If you have any questions or concerns, the first person to go to is your classroom teacher. The classroom teacher can help with:

- -Any questions about the classroom
- -Classroom rules and consequences
- -Homework and assignments

Step Two - School Principal

If you would like more information or you have questions that are beyond the classroom, the school principal can help.

- -Concerns about an individual school
- -Student registration
- -Student schedules
- -Report card concerns
- -Classroom concerns
- -Safety and security
- -Fundraising
- -School Council

Step Three - School Superintendents

Superintendents are responsible for a Network of Schools. They support school staff and can be contacted if you have questions that have not been answered or for help with:

- -Alternate attendance request
- -Suspension appeal

Step Four - Trustee

Trustees are your elected community officials. They are available to help you with the following areas of the TDSB:

- -Concerns about your community
- -Ideas and suggestions for the Board
- -Items on Board Agenda
- -Board policies under review
- -Board budget
- -Collective bargaining

VIRTUAL SCHOOL UPDATE:



Entering From or Returning to In-Person Learning (Elementary)

We recognize that parents/guardians and/or students may want to switch between inperson learning and Virtual School. It is important to note that, for health and safety reasons, and because of the impact switching would have on staffing, physical distancing and space allocation, it will not be possible to immediately transition between the two models. As a result, an opportunity to enter the Virtual School or to return to in-person learning will be provided at three key dates during the school year, as outlined below.

Movement from one model to another will be requested through the Principal of the student's home school. If a switch is required outside of the designated times, a limited number of exceptions may be made and will be reviewed by Principals on a case-by-case basis.

Opportunity to Change	Date the Change of Class would Take Effect	Deadline for Requesting Change
#1: Approximately One Month into School Year	October 13, 2020 (day after Thanksgiving)	September 30, 2020
#2: Following Progress Reporting Period	November 23, 2020	November 06, 2020
#3: Following Distribution of First Provincial Report Card	February 16, 2021 (day after Family Day Holiday)	January 29, 2021
